With a prayerful pace, and light that dispels darkness, we wait and hope for the promised child--the Son of God, the baby born in the manger.

For unto us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders.

And He will be called, Wonderful, Counsellor, mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Isaiah 9:6

Human wisdom, defined by Alexander Dumas, is summed up in two words: wait and hope. As you make your pilgrimage through this Advent season, do as I say and not as I do. Be wise. Immerse yourself fully, and without apology, in love, joy, peace, and most of all hope. Wait and hope for something notable, for something new.

It is November 10th. The coffee shop is promoting their "holiday" (Christmas?) special beverages, in cups decorated with holly. The advertising posters depict red packages with green and white ribbons. It is November 10th.

I remember hearing years ago that we live in an instant society. We have instant coffee, instant pudding and instant rice. Do you remember the television ad featuring the housekeeper of the Brady Bunch holding up her hand and declaring that the rice would be ready in 5 minutes? If we were an "instant society" 40 years ago, I am not sure what we are now. I am quite sure we have not become more patient in recent years. For the most part, we are an impatient lot.

Given our reluctance to wait it is little wonder that Advent gets short shrift. Now I don't want to give the impression that I am encouraging a kind of "bah humbug" (ala Ebenezer Scrooge) approach to Christmas. As those who are learning to follow Jesus we have every reason to celebrate the nativity. We, of all people, ought to have the most joyous festivities and celebrations. But this is exactly where Advent becomes for us a gift. The Christmas celebrations take on new significance when we can use Advent as a time for quiet reflection and preparation. If you are not in the habit, I encourage you to set aside time each day, even 5 or 10 minutes for quiet reflection, bible reading and prayer. Pray that the eyes of your heart will be open to see Jesus as he comes to meet you in prayer, bible reading, as you gather with his people on Sunday mornings around his Word and Table and as you reach out in humble service to others.

During these days of Advent leading up to December 25th "let every heart prepare him room" that we may know the fullness of God's joy as we sing: "Joy to the World, the Lord is come. Let earth receive her king".

Learning to Follow Jesus Together...

Over the past few months the Monday evening women's study and the Tuesday evening study group have both taken a look at," A Long Obedience In The Same Direction" by Eugene Peterson. This book is a reflection on the Psalms of Ascent, songs of praise sung by pilgrims as they travelled up to Jerusalem for the great festivals at the Temple. Two historical books of the Old Testament. Ezra and Nehemiah: readings from our Sunday services and the topic Angels have been part of our spiritual diet.

At present, the Tuesday group is discussing the book Bullseye-Aiming to Follow Jesus. This includes such topics as spiritual practices, worship, community, serving, giving and sharing Christ. The women's study is reading "Miracles" by C.S. Lewis. In addition to the two ongoing groups, a third is now being held once a month at the home of Peter and Trish. The book, "Unwearied Praises", is being used to explore the theology of some of the ancient hymns of the church.

If you are interested in reading and learning from scripture please join us. No experience is necessary. We all learn together as the Holy Spirit prompts us to ask questions and inspires us to share answers.

Taking Care of God's Creation!

Each year in the spring and fall our congregation cleans up the road side between Ida and Cavan. This year, for the first time, the spring cleanup was undertaken by



our youth group. On Friday evening, April 29th, about 14 youth and some parents worked in four groups, 3 along the roadside and one in the cemetery to make our surroundings more attractive. 8 bags of recycle and 6 bags of garbage were collected. After about one hour, we were back at the church eating a hotdog and ice cream feast. At the next youth meeting the cleanup was linked to a Bible study on taking care of God's creation.

Our second Adopt-a-Road activity took place on October 14th after church. Fourteen people collected 7 bags of recycle and 6 of garbage. Over two dozen water bottles were found scattered along the roadside. We have not encountered this many before. This is somewhat disappointing- but we shall keep on collecting! Please join us in the spring for our next Adopt-a- Road cleanup.

Remembrance Day and the Bell of St. John, Ida

This Remembrance Day, November 11, 2018, marked the 100th Anniversary of the end of the Great War, World War I. Churches across Canada were asked to ring their bells at 11:02 am, after two minutes of silence, to mark the armistice beginning at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month a century earlier. We were also asked to ring our bell as an act of remembrance "at the going down of the sun". For our region this occurred at 4:51 pm. Our congregation responded to both invitations. For all who gathered, as the bell tolled, we could not help but reflect on the sacrifices of the men and women who died or were maimed physically, mentally and emotionally in both WW I and WW II. The world longs for peace- a peace that only the Prince of Peace can bring.

'O God, it is your will to hold both heaven and earth in a single peace. Let the design of your great Love shine on the waste of our wraths and sorrows, and give Peace to your Church, Peace among nations, Peace in our homes, and Peace in our hearts; through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.' (Prayer for Peace, BAS, p 677)

Our bell was brought from Toronto by wagon in 1866 to install in the tower of the new brick church, our present building, in which the first service was held in January of 1867, the same year as Confederation.





The Bricks and Mortar of St. John's...

A recent Monday morning saw a determined group of men tackle the demolition of a 17 ft long section of sidewalk leading to the front door of our place of worship. An electric jackhammer powered by a 3500 watt generator did the job of fracturing the concrete so that many willing hands could load the chunks of concrete into a tractor loader bucket. From there they were dumped into a trailer for disposal.

While this was happening another crew with shovels was digging out around the posts of our historic sign located over our well. By attaching a sling and chain to the sign we were able, using the tractor, to straighten up a small southward lean to it. This work is being done in preparation for replacing our sign with a new one on aluminum instead of wood. This task also went very well and by noon we were able to wrap things up and go home for lunch.

Two days later we experienced an answer to prayer as we were able to secure a cubic meter of ready-mix concrete from CBM Cement near the east end of Stewart Line. This was placed and levelled by a smaller crew on very short notice. The only task remaining is to cut some expansion grooves into the new concrete, which will be done thanks to the loan of a

concrete saw from a member of our congregation.

Repair work on the front steps of the church was done by a contractor some time ago and now that the flower bed in front of the steps has been trimmed away for the winter, additional masonry work will be done to rebuild the stone wall in front of the landing.

Our well water tests conducted four times a year continue to show that our water is of the purest possible kind and entirely safe for consumption.

We arrange for twice annual pumping out of our septic holding tank, trying, if possible to avoid times when frozen ground causes us to pay extra storage costs.

Our garbage and recycling is picked up on the east side of County Rd. 10 every Friday except on holidays. The recycling is usually very early in the morning around 7:30am.

There are too many people to thank who I can call on short notice to help with a variety of tasks, ranging from putting storm window coverings on at this time of year and taking them off in the spring; cleaning flies out of the hanging lights in our nave or worship place, cleaning up cluster flies in windows, heading out into the wilds of Manvers seeking the perfect spruce for our Christmas tree, helping to erect the Nativity scene on the lawn or being part of a work detail such as the sidewalk repair project with which I began this report.

An ongoing debt of gratitude is owed to Ken J. and others who spend time throughout the year keeping our gardens looking beautiful, and to Albert P. who arranges yearly inspections of our furnaces and the changing of filters, and as well plays a lead role in the maintenance of our historic old pipe organ.

Catherine, what can you tell us about your life before faith in Christ took hold?

I was baptized on the first day after my birth, because I had been born three months premature. I have always felt I belonged to Jesus, and He was my Good Shepherd. Somehow I felt that the strong Christian faith of my Scots and Irish ancestors encouraged me to keep my heart set to follow my Lord Jesus.

What stirred you to take Jesus seriously?

By God's grace, I have always had a love for my Lord. In childhood, I loved the Lord's Prayer, and Christian friends, relatives and teachers modelled for me what a deep and thoughtful faith might look like.

Some people have a 'lightening bolt' conversion, while others experience more of a gradual sunrise in their faith. Was there a moment when it all made sense to you, or was it more of a process?

As I child, I felt close to our Lord especially in singing praise, at the reading of the Gospel and at Holy Communion. When I was 18, I was challenged to live out my faith by serving as a lay leader, and it was at that time I discovered the joy of being part of a small Christian group, studying, praying, serving, and laughing together. It was so much fun being together and growing in our Lord. I wish every follower of Jesus a similar experience of Christian community. And I thank St John's Ida for welcoming me into this warm and vital parish.

In what ways has your faith in Christ made a difference in your life?

I cannot really imagine my life without the presence of my Lord. However, I have found it at times a struggle to understand and practice all the ways our faith flows out into our daily life, whether in the heart, studies, family, daily work, and all of life.

If there is one thing you would want the world to know from your experience with God, what would it be?

Even though Christian faith is no longer as prevalent in our culture as it was, Jesus Christ is, and will always be, just as worthy of our love and worship. Let us pour out the precious perfume of our lives for His sake, as the forgiven woman of the Gospels boldly did.

One of my favourite prayers is this verse from the fifth century Irish St Patrick's Breastplate:

"Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger."

And finally, from Second Corinthians chapter 4:

5 For what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, with ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. 6 For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Update from The Can Man

I wish to report on this past year for our crushed cans for Sleeping Children Around the World (http://www.scaw.org).

We have had a rough year with the price of scrap aluminum in that the value of crushed cans dropped to \$0.05 per pound. I saved nearly 30 bags of crushed cans waiting for the price to rise but I found out the scrap dealer was paying up to \$0.20 per pound for uncrushed cans. I was told that the crushing equipment spilled crushed cans as they tried to make bales while the uncrushed cans stayed in place.

We are now collecting uncrushed aluminum cans and avoiding the labour of crushing them. With a bit of a struggle we were able to purchase 5 bed kits @ \$35.00 each, to bring our ongoing total up to 78. Each kit includes a mat or mattress, pillow, sheet, blanket, mosquito net (if applicable), clothes outfit, towel and school supplies.

Keep those pop cans coming. Just drop them around the Mitsubishi on Sunday morning.

Cavan Hills Cross Country Run

September 22nd, 2018 - RACE DAY!!

It was Friday morning, the day before our Run/walk and the weather for the evening was forecasted to be very windy. Would we put up our tent/canopies as usual before the big day or not? We were led to do as much preparation as we could and to leave the erection of the tents to very early Sat. morning. The numerous volunteers (for which we are very thankful) headed home and I headed for Omemee to pick up a trailer which had been loaned to us to replace the usual one, lost in an early morning July barn fire.

Sat. morning early before sunrise our helpers arrived to put everything into place. We had new tables thanks to a generous donation from the McCamus'. As the day dawned, we began to sense that the weather would be perfect for running or walking. Though our pre-race registrations had been lower than expected, more people registered on race day than ever before, bringing our number of competitors to 132 including 43 children and youth.

Our prayers were answered as the morning went by with many smiling faces even when some of them were struggling for breath. Our large contingent of helpers were there on the job all around the courses and on the site at the McCamus farm. The Hospitality tent was, as usual, a popular spot as everyone sampled the delicious treats being offered.

Weeks have gone by since that day and we have learned, thanks to Jim our treasurer, that we were also greatly blessed financially! St. John's has been able to distribute \$6500 in Outreach funds to many worthy recipients. Thanks be to God and to Vicki and our committee, and all who volunteered and helped out.




St. John's Quilts for Cancer
